

Participant Information: Atopic Dermatitis Photographs for the PossibLity Study

As you may have already done yourself in the past, it can be very useful to take pictures of the areas of your body affected by atopic dermatitis to be able to monitor the progression of this condition over time, like looking back at how it was a few months ago compared to now. You may have also done this to show your doctor what you are experiencing. During the PossibLity study, we would like to do the same.

We understand that body photography is a sensitive topic, and many participants may have concerns about privacy, dignity, and the handling of these images. Please be assured that your comfort and confidentiality are our top priorities.

Photos of your eczema will only be taken once you have given your consent to participate in this study.

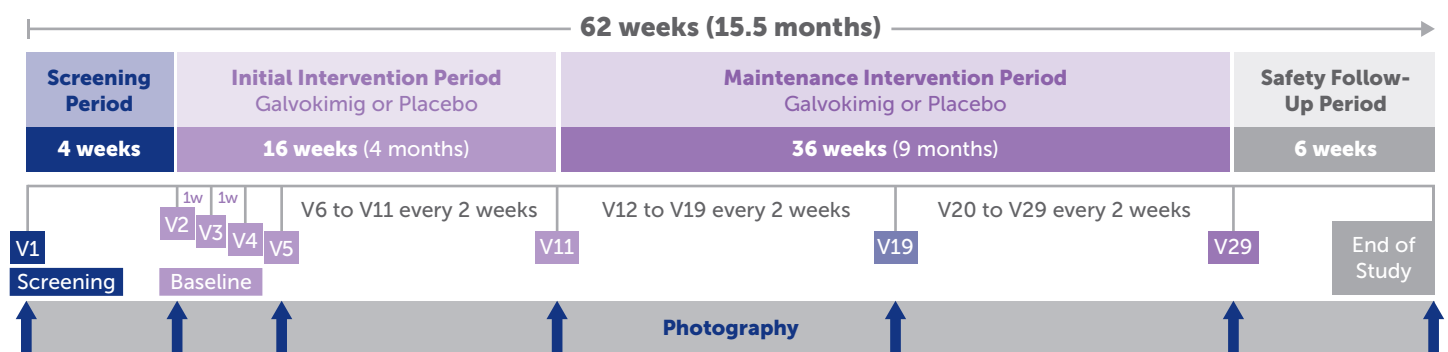
Why Is Photography Important?

Photographs provide a consistent, objective way to assess skin changes over time. The photographs of your skin taken during the PossibLity Study help researchers see the evolution of your eczema symptoms while you're in the study.

When to Expect Body Photography?

If you have consented to the study, skin photography will be taken during the following visits:

- Screening Visit (Visit 1)
- Baseline Visit (Visit 2)
- Visit 5 (Week 4)
- Visit 11 (Week 16)
- Visit 19 (Week 32)
- Visit 29 (Week 52)
- End of Study Visit (6 weeks after the last scheduled visit)



Clinical Photography Experience

As soon as photos are taken, you will have the opportunity to view them either on the camera screen or a nearby monitor. If you are not happy with the photo—no matter the reason—we will retake the image(s).

How We Protect Your Privacy

- 1. Informed Consent:** Before you participate in the study and any photographs are taken, you will be asked to review and sign a detailed consent form. You can withdraw your consent for participation in the study at any time for any reason.
- 2. Protecting your privacy:** All photographs will be taken in a way that protects your identity. To do so, any identifying features such as tattoos, birthmarks, or other unique characteristics will be removed or masked before use in any publications, presentations, or data sharing. The eyes will be covered using a digital method of concealment, for example by putting black bars over the eyes.
- 3. Photography Procedures:** The photographs that will be taken of you at each visit include your full body; front and back (torso and arms and legs). The aim is to have as much data visible in these images as possible which will require taking off your clothes. If you are uncomfortable with this, minimally covering undergarments may be left on.
- 4. Secure Storage:** Images will be stored on encrypted, password-protected systems that fulfill regulatory and international standards for data protection and privacy. Access to these systems will only be given to authorized study personnel that are required to see or review the images. No other access is given to additional members unless necessary. QuantifiCare's central server (where all images are uploaded and stored) is 21CFR Part 11 compliant, which means it meets very strict requirements in terms of security, reliability, integrity, and accountability.
- 5. Limited Use and Access:** Your images will only be used for the purposes outlined in the study consent form.
- 6. Certificates of Confidentiality:** This study is protected by a Certificate of Confidentiality from the United States National Institutes of Health (NIH), which helps keep your personal and sensitive information private—even if someone tries to get it through legal means—unless you give your consent.

Your Rights

- You may request to review or delete any image taken of you.
- If at any point you are no longer comfortable with the photography or any other part of the Possiblity study, you may cancel your participation at any time without penalty.
- You can communicate with the study team at any time with any questions or concerns you may have.
